SERMON DISCUSSION GUIDE

Read & Pray

The sermon passage was Luke 23:1–26. Read Luke 23:1–12 and 18–23, which captures some key themes. After reading, pray for God to open our hearts to discuss and apply these truths.

Sermon Recap

Review the sermon with your group, highlighting the following:

- "At the center of Christianity is not a new perspective on life or a new moral code, but an empty tomb that literally changes everything."
- "Luke 23 marks that dividing line with humanity. In Luke 23, we meet five people ... whose different responses to the cross literally divide them for eternity—some going on to everlasting life, and others to everlasting death."
- "Pilate was so preoccupied with earthly pressures that he didn't have time to consider a question like who Jesus actually was."
- "Jesus has no answer for the superficial [Herod]. He reveals himself only to those who seek him with all their hearts."
- "Billy Graham famously said, 'It's not most people's sins that will send them to hell; it's their good works, their false sense of righteousness."
- "Barabbas is the first in a long line of people who are going to be set free because Jesus dies in his place."

Group Discussion

- 1. Pastor J.D. identified five responses to Jesus (preoccupied, superficial, proud, guilty, disciple). Which response do you most identify with and why?
- 2. How does Pilate's preoccupation in vv.1-7 reflect our distractions that keep us from seriously considering Jesus?
- 3. Consider the religious leaders' response to Jesus. Of all the people, why is it that the people *this* involved in religious work are so far away from Christ?
- 4. Pastor J.D. asked, "Which side of Jesus are you on?" How would you answer that today, and what leads you to that answer?
- 5. How does Jesus' silence, showing him pleading guilty for our sins, deepen your gratitude for his death in your place?
